Professor Barry Judd

Deputy Vice-Chancellor (Indigenous)

Professor Barry Judd is Deputy Vice-Chancellor (Indigenous) and Professor Indigenous Studies in the School of Culture and Communication at the University of Melbourne. In his role as DVC, Professor Judd has responsibility for institutional policy, strategy, and advice in relation to all aspects of Indigenous higher education. Professor Judd holds an MA in Public Policy and a PhD in Australian Indigenous Studies and holds postgraduate qualifications in higher education teaching and learning. His area of research expertise relates to Australian race relations in Australian sports and interdisciplinary research methods in Indigenous Studies and Australian history.



Professor Aaron Corn

Inaugural Director, Indigenous Knowledge Institute

Professor Aaron Corn has three decades of experience collaborating closely with Indigenous colleagues, advocating for Indigenous knowledge recognition through research and education initiatives. He holds a PhD from the University of Melbourne and previously lectured in Australian Indigenous Studies, working extensively with Indigenous collaborators in Arnhem Land, including founders of Yothu Yindi and the Yothu Yindi Foundation. Recently, he directed the National Centre for Aboriginal Language and Music Studies and the Centre for Aboriginal Studies in Music at the University of Adelaide. Since 2010, he has directed the National Recording Project for Indigenous Performance in Australia and served on the Australian Research Council College of Experts.



Professor Richard Chenhall

Director, Centre for Health Equity, Melbourne School of Population and Global Health

Professor Richard Chenhall has collaborated with Indigenous communities for 25 years on health topics such as social determinants, alcohol and drug use, treatment, and management plans, as well as sexual health and chronic diseases. He has engaged with communities in Arnhem Land, Darwin, NSW, Victoria, and Western Australia. Richard has coordinated Master of Public Health subjects for 23 years, focusing on Indigenous health, qualitative research methods, public health impact, and community-based participatory research. Currently, he heads the Health, Humanities, and Social Science Unit and chairs the STEMM 3 Human Research Ethics Committee at the University of Melbourne.
